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FROM THE PRESIDENT

The period July 2015 to June 2016 has been an extraordinarily productive one for the Society, made possible by the visionary decisions some years ago to invest in the establishment of core services functions to support our programs. This core administrative support allowed the Executive Committee to embark with full confidence on not only a thorough review of the Society's governance arrangements, but also some very exciting new initiatives.

At last year's Annual General Meeting, we were given the mandate to thoroughly review the ARMS governance arrangements, and this initiative was advanced through a facilitated workshop led by our colleagues from the UK's Association of Research Administrator's and Managers (ARMA, UK). We gained invaluable input from Committee members, Past Presidents, Chapter representatives and a range of key stakeholders who contributed to our review. The views of Past Presidents were especially helpful and an example of the depth of expertise now available as our Society matures. Recommendations for the review have been articulated to the membership and are expected to be endorsed at the Annual General Meeting of the Society on 13 September 2016.

The Executive Committee made the decision this year to more clearly define those areas in public policy where the Society has a unique and important contribution to make. The Executive decided as a minimum, that it respond in a timely and professional manner to government calls for submissions in areas relevant to research management, and join in the national conversation when relevant issues are publicly raised and relevant announcements are made. Members of the Research Directors' Special Interest Group drafted a response to two major research policy consultations in Australia this year - "ARC Engagement and Impact Assessment Consultation Paper" and "Industry Partnership and Continuous Linkage". These papers are available on the ARMS website.

The development of a Professional Level Accreditation Program was an exciting initiative overseen by the ARMS Accreditation Council. This new level of accreditation will recognise the specific circumstances of many people in the sector who have gained sound knowledge and skills through their work, beyond the Foundation Level program. The first 13 participants commenced their one-year accreditation journey in May. The Professional Level program focusses on consolidating leadership capabilities and includes a business mentoring scheme that will help people deal with the more complex aspects of research management.

I wish to thank my colleagues on the ARMS Executive for their tremendous hard work and collegiality during this period. Particular gratitude goes to Dr Simon Kerr, Immediate Past President who steps down after three years on the ARMS Executive.

Finally, I extend my gratitude to all our volunteer members for their dedication and contributions to this great Society and to their employing organisations who support them.

MEMBERSHIP

The Society has a base of 2,459 members which includes all corporate and individual membership types described below. The geographical distribution of our members is summarised in Graph 1.

Corporate Membership: This category is designed for those members whose fees are met by their employing organisation, which is actively engaged in, or supports the research enterprise. The maximum number of voting members in each employing organisation under this category is 20, but this does not exclude the employing organisation from identifying further non-voting members.

Individual Membership: This category has two tiers.

Tier 1: Standard Individual Membership

This category is designed for individuals who are employed or active in the field of research management and/or administration at any level and with any sector of the research community. Each individual has voting privileges in the Society.

Tier 2: Small Organisation Membership

This category is designed for small organisations such as Medical Research Institutes, Government Organisations, and Cooperative Research Centres, and offers a 10% discount on the Standard Individual Membership rate when 6-10 members at the same organisation pay their membership fee on a single invoice.

Each Small Organisation Member under this category has voting privileges in the Society.

Retired Membership: This category is designed for current members who have retired from the research management sector but wish to remain a part of the Society.



MANAGEMENT AND STRUCTURE OF ARMS

ARMS is the Australasian professional association for research managers and administrators. We have members from universities, independent research institutions, government research, and health organisations. Our members span the Australasian geography, from Singapore, New Zealand, and Australia.

ARMS is an incorporated association formed in 1999. It is a non-profit organisation governed by an approved ARMS Constitution and operationalised by a set of by-laws.

ARMS is a Registrable Australian Body Limited by Guarantee (ARBN 609 051 443).

APPOINTMENT OF OFFICE BEARERS AND COMMITTEE MEMBERS

The ARMS Executive is the governing body of the Society and it controls and directs the affairs of the Society, including its committees and publications. The Executive determines the Society's promotions, policies, and strategic planning, and it evaluates the Society's progress towards achieving its mission and goals. The Executive has statutory responsibility for all ARMS activities throughout the Society.

The Executive includes five office bearers - President, President-Elect, Immediate Past President, Secretary, and Treasurer. At the 18 September 2014, Annual General Meeting (AGM) the term of the President was extended to two years (Secretary and Treasurer are also two-year terms) The role of Immediate Past President will be phased out in 2016.

The Executive also includes four general Committee Members who are appointed on two-year terms. The President of the Society is the Chair of the Executive.

The ARMS Chief Operating Officer (COO) is an ex-officio member of the Executive and provides operational support for the Executive and the Society more broadly.

INDUCTION


All new office bearers and committee members meet with the President and the ARMS COO to be briefed about their role and their responsibilities within the context of the strategic direction of the Society. Each new member is provided with an overview of the operations of the Society, its governance structure and policies.

ORGANISATION

To further its mission, ARMS is organised into Chapters, Standing Committees, and Special Interest Groups which may change over time, subject to the needs of the Society and the approval of the Executive Committee. These structures report to the Executive Committee and are directed by the strategic goals and operational principles outlined in the ARMS Strategic Plan.

REVIEW OF GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE

As the breadth and complexity of activities undertaken by ARMS continually expands, it becomes increasingly important that our governance arrangements are optimally structured to enable a more efficient, effective, sustainable, and accountable means of supporting current business and future developments. The ARMS Executive began an evaluation of its existing governance framework in November 2015 when the Executive Committee attended a facilitated workshop led by colleagues from our UK sister society, ARMA. A number of key recommendations were identified from this workshop, the most significant being that the ARMS organisational structure should be converted to a Board structure. It is envisaged that the conversion of the existing Executive to a Board will not change the current management and operational procedure of ARMS, but rather will clarify the role of the Board and the management of ARMS moving forward.

Following extensive consultation with ARMS Members, including Past Presidents of the Society a revised corporate governance structure was considered by the Executive in June 2016. A final paper has been prepared outlining a more robust governance model for consideration and final endorsement of the membership at the Annual General Meeting of the Society on 13 September 2016.



ARMS STRATEGIC PLAN

As part of the review of the ARMS governance structure, an extensive evaluation of the Society's strategic priorities was also undertaken which resulted in the development of a revised Strategic Plan for the period 2016-2018. The Strategic Plan will guide decision-making to ensure the delivery of ARMS' mission for its members. It has been designed to shape the programs we deliver, the services we provide, and the management of our business and finances to grow a sustainable, successful Society.

The 2016-2018 Strategic Plan will be released on 12 September, 2016 and will include an implementation plan which will identify priority actions, timeframes for delivery, and anticipated outcomes.

To create an internationally-connected community of research managers and administrators who operate at the highest standards to support and enhance the global delivery of research excellence.


OUR MISSION

ARMS ACCREDITATION PROGRAM

FOUNDATION LEVEL ACCREDITATION PROGRAM

The ARMS Foundation Level Accreditation Program commenced in September 2013 with the launch of eight Foundation Level modules at the ARMS Adelaide Conference which resulted in 358 unit registrations. Since this initial delivery, we now offer 10 modules which has resulted in over 1400 unit registrations, with additional delivery planned for Chapter events throughout 2016.

An analysis of Foundation Level module attendances indicates that the three compulsory modules have been most well-attended (National Research and Innovation System in Australia, Legislation as it Affects Research in Australia, and Understanding Research and Researchers). The Pre-Award and Post-Award modules have also attracted many participants, as has the Research Data and Analytics module. Plans are also underway to deliver the New Zealand modules later in 2016 and early 2017.

Since the commencement of the Foundation Level program we have added two new Singapore-specific modules, both of which have been well-attended.

A review of all existing modules to ensure content is current has also been instigated.

The Foundation Level Accreditation Program has graduated to date 141 people with the post-nominal **Accredited Research Managers (Foundation) or ARMFs** with several more to graduate before the end of 2016. We are pleased to announce that the first cohort from Singapore graduated in May 2016.

In March 2016, the Accreditation Council approved the development of two additional Foundation Level Accreditation modules designed specifically for those involved in managing higher degrees by research (HDR). We expect the modules to be relevant to research degree coordinators, mid-level to senior administrative staff, as well as to those in managerial roles. The two new modules, Research Higher Degree Scholarships and Higher Degree by Research International Partnerships, will be delivered for the first time at the INORMS Congress in Melbourne on 12 September 2016.

PROFESSIONAL LEVEL ACCREDITATION PROGRAM

The Society launched its professional accreditation programme, attracting 13 initial participants. This program is aimed at developing leaders in research management and combines contemporary leadership theory and practice grounded in a research management context. It includes a blend of learning styles incorporating taught material with case studies, group learning, workplace assignments, and individual mentoring.

The 12-month program consists of:

- A core two-and-a-half-day program focusing on leadership management and strategic thinking;
- Two, one-day electives focusing on deep, relevant content knowledge from a selection of five specialty areas;
- A workplace activity based on core and elective modules;
- Participation in ongoing group learning activities; and
- Professional mentoring and coaching activity.

In September 2015, the Society called for tender for the development and delivery of the core program and the five specialty electives. The successful tenderers were:

- Adjunct Research Fellow Graham Andrewartha, Dr Mark Hochman and Dr John Smart for the core program.
- Dr Paul Wong for elective “Evidence Based Analysis of Research Performance”;
- Dr Rado Faletic and Dr Martin Grabert for elective “Understanding International Research Funding”;
- Dr Mark Hochman for elective “Research Impact: Assessing the Societal Benefit of Research”;
- Dr Jodi Glading for elective “Research Governance”; and
- Professor Moira Clay for elective “Development of Institutional Talent”.

The core program was delivered in May 2016 and had received supportive feedback.

The Society has made the five electives available to the broader ARMS membership, forming the inaugural Winter School which is scheduled for delivery in August 2016. It is anticipated that the Winter School will be delivered again in June 2017.

ACCREDITATION COUNCIL

The Accreditation Council is the body established by ARMS to oversee quality assurance and assessment processes associated with the ARMS accreditation program.

Professor Jim Piper and Dr Lesley Middleton will complete their term on the Accreditation Council on 1 July 2016. Their replacements are Professor Lee Astheimer (retired DVCR, Deakin University) and Dr Yelena Hill, Te Puni Kōkiri, New Zealand respectively.

ARMS acknowledges the work of all members of the Accreditation Council, in particular to the inaugural Chair, Professor Jim Piper, for their dedication in this voluntary task.

CHAPTER HIGHLIGHTS

ACT CHAPTER

The ACT Chapter has been extremely active between the period of June 2015 and June 2016.

The number of attendees and engagement of participants has significantly increased, the quality of speakers and the topics have all been appreciated, and there has been greater interaction and attendance by new audiences – such as those from the finance divisions of ARMS member institutions, local research organisations, consultancy firms dealing with research policy, and government.

The Chapter delivered the following well-attended events during the reporting period:

- A session on development and management of budgets for research projects at the University of Canberra Teaching and Learning Lounge;
- End of year celebration for members. Attendance was thin as it was the end of the year, but there was a lively set of discussions on various research-related matters at the Australian National University (ANU) Fellows Bar;
- Networking meet and greet over TED talks;
- Panel discussion on Impact and Innovation with talks from policy-makers and senior managers; and
- Seminar on Nuts and Bolts of Research that covers the major aspects of research administration.

NEW SOUTH WALES CHAPTER

The NSW Chapter committee held a key meeting in May 2016 where Dr Ted Rohr from UNSW (and a member of the ARMS Executive) presented an overview of the proposed changes to the ARMS governance structure. Attendees were in support of the proposed changes and provided valuable feedback.

Delivery of ARMS Foundation Level Accreditation Modules were the main focus for the Chapter in 2016. It delivered four Foundation Level modules which were well attended and included repeat attendees which is representative of both the quality of the presenters and the perceived value of the modules. These were:

- Accreditation Module C: Legislation as it affects research in Australia;
- Accreditation Module E: Understanding Research and Researchers;
- Accreditation Module H: Pre-award Grants Processes; and
- Accreditation Module I: Post-award Processes.

Two \$1,000 ARMS Travel Awards for attendance at INORMS 2016 were awarded by the NSW Chapter in June. The recipients were:

The Chapter Committee held an annual face-to-face meeting in Auckland, at the Massey University Albany campus, in December 2015.

Future events, including delivery of Foundation Level Accreditation Program modules, are planned for the second half of 2016.

QUEENSLAND/NT/PNG CHAPTER

The QLD/NT/PNG Chapter continued its focus on raising awareness of ARMS and broadening the membership base. This was achieved through development of specific training workshops with third party providers, co-sponsoring events, and use of social media channels for pre- and post-event promotion. The Chapter has seen registered members increase from approximately 300 to 430.

A number of professional development events were made available to members during the reporting period:

Building Professional Relationships: Business Development in a University Research Context.

With the increasing importance of external engagement across a number of research support roles, a one-day workshop was developed in conjunction with the Australian Institute of Management. There is an opportunity for workshop material developed in this partnership to be used across ARMS.

“The Thesis Whisperer” Dr Inger Mewburn (ANU). The Chapter co-sponsored the visit of Dr Mewburn in conjunction with a HDR Support Network. Dr Mewburn provided an engaging discussion of *‘How to prepare (right now) for life after your PhD’*.

Chapter Annual Workshop. The workshop had three keynote presentations (*Building a Vibrant Research Sector in Queensland; The ARC goes POP! Reflections on the ARC Panel Observer Program; Research Impact and Engagement: Overview of Initiatives in the Sector*) followed by themed breakout sessions (research development; HDR student administration; and research ethics and integrity) before the day closed out with a Research AdminisTrivia Quiz.

SINGAPORE CHAPTER

The Singapore Chapter supported the ARMS 2015 Conference organising Committee during the delivery of the annual conference in September 2015. Specifically, the Chapter provided assistance with the facilitation of a series of pre-conference activities.

The Chapter also facilitated the delivery of four ARMS Accreditation modules prior to the conference - National Research and Innovation System in Singapore (Module K), Legislation as it Affects Research in Singapore (Module L), Pre-Award Grants Processes (Module H), and Research Data and Analytics (Module J). These were delivered at the Nanyang Technological University (NTU) on 29 September 2015.

Dr Helen Marsden, ARMS Executive Committee member gave a presentation to DUKE-NUS Medical School on 25 May 2016 entitled *“Helping you Achieve Your Research Goals”*. This was the first introduction to ARMS and its member benefits to this cohort. The audience comprised a blend of senior and junior Research Fellows, Research Associates and PhD students.

NTU held the ARMS Foundation level Accreditation Module L *“Legislation as it Affects Research in Singapore”* on 21 June 2016. The module was delivered by Ms Tricia Huang, Executive Director, National Medical Research Council, Ministry of Health.

The first cohort of Accredited Research Managers (Foundation) from the Singapore Chapter were conferred in May 2016. All recipients are detailed in Appendix A.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA CHAPTER

The SA Chapter Committee includes nominees from The University of Adelaide, University of South Australia, Flinders University and CSIRO as well as individual member representation. The chapter committee met every two months during the reporting period and offered SA Chapter members a selection of social/networking functions, professional development/guest speaker functions, an AGM, and Foundation Level Accreditation delivery.

The Chapter offered for the second time the very successful bibliometrics workshop, presented by Adam Finch from CSIRO, followed by a networking session at the Ibis Hotel. 2015 ended with an engaging panel session involving the three Deputy Vice Chancellors (Research): Professor Tanya Monro (UniSA), Professor Rob Saint (Flinders University), Professor Julie Owens (The University of Adelaide). We acknowledge the contributions of the DVCRs and especially Dr Ross McLennan (UniSA) for moderating the discussion. The discussion panel and networking session took place at the Tivoli Hotel and was preceded by the Chapter's AGM.

The SA Chapter Committee this year awarded the annual ARMS Chapter Travel Awards to Ms Alison Elder (Flinders) and Ms Nima Nezhad (Flinders) to attend the Singapore conference.

We would like to extend our thanks to our volunteer committee members (both current and outgoing) and to our member organisations for providing the support and facilities that enable our local chapter committee to continue.

TASMANIA CHAPTER

The Tasmania chapter continues to provide a platform for research managers and administrators from across the state to come together to share knowledge and support best practice in the region. In June 2016, the Chapter welcomed ARMS Executive Committee members to Hobart to join with us in our first birthday celebrations. The evening, which included a panel discussion on mentors in shaping your career featuring members of the Executive Committee, was well-attended with many members commenting on how much they enjoyed the opportunity to network (over a glass of Tasmanian wine) with members of the ARMS Executive Committee.

To help inform the direction of our relatively new chapter, in February 2016 the Chapter Committee distributed a planning survey to Tasmanian Chapter members to elicit feedback about how we can best support them to engage with ARMS. Interestingly, over 90% of respondents indicated that they were interested in joining a regular informal catch-up with other research administrators and managers and that they were interested in ways of sharing best practice research management experiences for example via presentations/panel discussions. With close to 100% of respondents indicating that they would be willing to travel either within Tasmania or Australia more broadly to attend events, the Tasmanian Chapter will continue to find ways of supporting members to attend local and national events.

VICTORIA CHAPTER

An exciting year for the Victorian Chapter as the INORMS 2016 Congress was hosted in Melbourne. With over 800 delegates attending the conference, it was a great chance to showcase Melbourne and to also delve into the theme of the congress, “*Research Management in a Connected World*”. Attendees from universities, research institutes, government agencies, and the private and not-for-profit sectors shared best practice and learnings. The INORMS Congress also facilitated connections on a personal, collegial, and institutional level.

During the reporting period, the Chapter focused on the delivery of professional development and networking opportunities which addressed national and international issues of relevance for research administrators and managers. As the research sector rapidly changes, so do opportunities for smart, educated, and engaged research administrators and managers.

As part of their continuing Accreditation roll-out, the Victorian Chapter hosted Module C: Legislation as it Affects Research in Australia; Module E: Understanding Research and Researchers; Module I: Post-Award Processes; and Module J: Research Data and Analytics during their annual Chapter event in June, 2016 which were all well-attended.

The Chapter, in partnership with The Centre for Workplace Leadership, delivered a tailored full-day program to build and reflect on leadership skills and link the participant with a great network of peers across Australasia – elements that are essential for professional development in research administration. The program comprised four interactive sessions underpinned by a pre-program self-diagnostic. Research administration can be complex and difficult. And it undoubtedly requires considerable leadership capability. Leadership is about influencing job objectives and strategies, influencing commitment and compliance in task behaviour to achieve these objectives, influencing group identification and maintenance, and influencing the culture of an organisation. The day started with a highly-engaging personal session which explored the purpose and foundation of workplace performance. Then session then moved into mastery, examining two critical elements of working in teams and in organisations: strategic influence and navigating complexity, and concluded with a session on the Danish concept of Arbejdsglaede (Work Happiness).

WESTERN AUSTRALIA CHAPTER

The WA Chapter held nine events during the reporting period, providing a significant number of opportunities for professional development and strengthening local networks for the over 320 attendees. Included amongst the events was training for nine of the Foundation Level modules which resulted in 170 unit registrations. The second Accreditation Graduation Ceremony was held on 17 March 2016 with certificates presented to the graduating members by ARMS President, Ms Janice Besch.

The popularity of these events is on the rise in WA, with each event attracting a growing number of members and non-members. This in part due to the commitment of newly accredited members to undertake continuing professional development but also the attractiveness and relevance of programs being offered. An example of one highly popular event was a group of presentations given by four speakers representing higher education, consultancy, industry, and charity organisations. It was an engaging demonstration of the wide range of places a career in research management can lead.

The WA Chapter Committee has a full and stable membership with one new member welcomed at the November AGM. This is further evidence of the high level of support and interest in ARMS in WA and the Committee continue to work hard to engage with and provide value for the growing membership base in the region.

INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEE

The International Committee (IC) develops ARMS' international linkages and fosters member awareness of international developments. It has the leading role in the Society's linkages and networks in foreign countries; ensures that annual meetings, educational programs, and ARMS publications contain international content; and encourages members to share best practices from Australasia with peers internationally.

The International Committee commenced 2016 with a face-to-face meeting in February in Sydney and has subsequently met each six weeks, via teleconference.

Priorities progressed by the Committee included:

The National Council of University Research Administrators (NCURA) and ARMS launched a reciprocal fellowship program for their members for the purpose of (i) training research administrators, and (ii) enhancing collaborations in global research management. We greatly acknowledge the work of Ms Julie Ward from UNSW Australia for leading this initiative.

The program provides an opportunity for ARMS members to travel to an NCURA host institution and for NCURA members to travel to an ARMS host institution where they immerse themselves in a program of mutual learning and knowledge exchange. Fellows are expected to share their experiences and knowledge of how research management operates at their institution, identify and learn best practices and local knowledge of the host institution, and respect all appropriate organisational rules and cultural practices. Fellows are also asked to present at Chapter events and national conferences.

For the 2015/16 program round, ARMS received six applications and awarded three fellowships to:

- Dr David Huang, National Institute of Education, Singapore (host institute – Harvard University)
- Ms Barbara Slattery, University of Melbourne (host institute – University of California, San Francisco)
- Dr Jonathan O’Donnell, RMIT University (host institute – Northwestern University)

Each recipient received AUD\$2000 contribution towards their fellowship.

NCURA received ten applications and awarded two fellowships under this round to the following:

On 20 May 2016, ARMS was hosted by the Department of Industry, Innovation and Science (DIIS) to convene the *“Comparing Approaches, Policies and Programs that Support International Research and Collaboration: Australian Workshop”* in Canberra. Run over a full day, and attended by representatives of several universities, the ARC, NHMRC, DIIS, and consular representatives, the workshop was a great opportunity to raise and discuss key issues affecting Australian research institutions’ ability to engage internationally. Topics discussed included the types of domestic funding available, thinking behind specific programs, the strategic partnerships and investments made by institutions, and the need to address critical gaps in program design and implementation.

This is the first ‘Think Tank’ style workshop ARMS has convened in this area. It is envisioned that it will continue to support similar events on topics of critical interest to the profession in Australia, New Zealand, and Singapore. We greatly acknowledge the work of Dr Adrian Collins from The University of Melbourne who led this initiative. Presentation slides from the workshop are available to members on the ARMS website.

The International Committee is the primary representative for ARMS on the International Network of Research Management Societies (INORMS). Together, INORMS represents a global membership of approximately 20,000 people and 250 organisations. The INORMS Working Group has representatives from the major organisations, of which ARMS is one. As our membership spans three countries – Australia, New Zealand, and Singapore – ARMS is perhaps the most international of all research management associations amongst the Group. The International Committee actively shares and promotes Group activities through the ARMS Newsletter. A more focussed survey on professional development opportunities across associations is now underway under the project banner “Research Administration as a Profession”, with a view to identifying touchstones for international collaboration on this front. Survey results will be presented at the INORMS Congress, to be held in Melbourne in September 2016.



MARKETING AND COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

The Marketing and Communications Committee is responsible for the promotion and reputation of ARMS through quality and professional communications.

The committee has been working with the ARMS Executive Office to deliver a new interactive web platform which was launched at the ARMS Singapore Conference in September 2015. More than a communications tool, the website now provides intranet capabilities and a knowledge storehouse for use by our wide ranging Special Interest Groups. The new website is also our member database and links to the ARMS finance system to produce invoicing and member management. The website is attractive, easy to manage, and a great resource in support of future services delivery.

POLICY STANDING COMMITTEE

The Policy Standing Committee is responsible for developing and implementing policy and advocacy strategies to ensure ARMS remains the peak body for the profession in the region. The Committee also coordinates the ARMS response to relevant government policy documents and reviews, and contributes to annual peak body activities such as the ARC/NHMRC Research Administrators Seminar and the University Research Office New Zealand (URONZ) meeting.

The Policy Standing Committee comprises the President, Ms Janice Besch and Immediate Past President, Dr Simon Kerr. Subject specialists are co-opted as required.

Through the ARMS Executive, the Policy Standing Committee made the decision in March 2016 to more clearly define those areas in public policy where the Society has a unique and important contribution to make. In June 2016, the Executive agreed that, as a minimum, the Society should be able to respond in a timely and professional manner to government calls for submissions in areas relevant to research management, and to join in the national conversation when issues of relevance to the profession are publicly raised.

Members of the Research Directors' Special Interest Group took the lead in responding to two major research policy consultations in Australia during the reporting period. SIG Convenor, Dr Louise Fleck and SIG member Dr Ksenia Sawczak were major contributors in the preparation of the ARMS response to the ARC Engagement and Impact Assessment Paper and the Shaper Incentives for Engagement Consultation Paper. ARMS members can access the submissions on the ARMS website.

In the area of policy and advocacy, ARMS Treasurer Michelle Duryea represented the Society on the International Open Research and Contributor ID (ORCID) Australia Consortium's Working Group at a critical time in its development. ORCID is an open, non-profit, community-driven international effort to create and maintain a registry of unique researcher identifiers and a transparent method of linking research activities and outputs to these identifiers.

The Policy Standing Committee also coordinated two round table sessions at the 2015 ARC/NHMRC Research Administrator's Seminar in Canberra. Input was also sourced from the University Research Directors' Special Interest Group on relevant roundtable topics: increasing applicant/grantee compliance; discussion of types of training that research offices provide to applicants; communicating complaints; evaluation of Multi Institutional Agreements (MIAs) and other inter-institutional interactions; and open access requirements.

Only three years old, the Singapore Chapter worked under the leadership of Chapter Convenor Professor Michael Khor and Co-Convenor, Dr Sianna Panagiotopoulos to host the Society's first ever ARMS Conference in South East Asia. The Conference, "*Research Management in a Global Context*" attracted 416 delegates, 40% being first-time attendees. Delegates attending beyond the ARMS region came from Canada, China, Denmark, Japan, Saudi Arabia, Malaysia, the Philippines, South Africa, Switzerland, Taiwan, Thailand, the UK, USA, and West Africa. A content highlight, amongst many, was the very thorough step-by-step account generously provided by Professor Lam Khin Yong, Chief of Staff and Vice President (Research) on Nanyang Technological University's eight steps to becoming a research intensive university in the Asia region.

STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIPS

AUSTRALASIAN ETHICS NETWORK (AEN)

The Australasian Ethics Network (AEN) is a professional network of members and administrators and researchers from human research ethics committees or involved in human research. The relationship between ARMS and the AEN has been growing steadily and resulted in an agreement on operating principles in January 2015. The AEN does not have its own legal structure and now operates as a stream of the ARMS Ethics & Research Integrity Special Interest Group (SIG).

The AEN held a successful workshop “Ethics in the Field” at Macquarie University in November, 2015. The event was well-attended by Human Research Committee members and Chairs, and administrators. As a resource, the workshop was professionally filmed and edited. The videos will be available to all ARMS members on the ARMS website.

The AEN has also been working with an associated group: The Australasian Association of Bioethics and Health Law. It is anticipated that the 2018 AEN conference will be combined with AABLE.

The 2016 AEN conference will be held in Adelaide on 23-25, November 2016.

AUSTRALASIAN RESEARCH TRAINING NETWORK (ARTN)

An agreement was signed in October 2015 between the Australasian Research Training Network (ARTN) and ARMS. The purpose of this agreement was to provide a legal structure (‘Operating Principles’) to support the functions of the ARTN. The agreement includes the formation of an ARTN Advisory Group whose role is to steer the activities of the ARTN and is composed of nominated ARMS members. The Chair of the Advisory Group is one of the Co-Convenors of the ARMS Directors of Higher Degree Research Special Interest Group, elected by the Advisory Group and confirmed by the ARMS Executive.

A targeted call for Advisory Group members was made in April 2015. To ensure equity, a working group to the ARMS Executive recommended that there be one representative from each university and that the appointee holds a middle to senior management role in the research training sector.

The ARMS Executive endorsed the appointment of the following to the ARTN Advisory Group:

- Professor Joe Luca (Dean Graduate School, Edith Cowan University) was appointed as Co-Convenor
- Professor Lucy Johnston (Dean Graduate Studies, The University of Newcastle) was appointed as Co-Convenor.

In 2014, ARMS was the successful bidder for delivery of the 6th INORMS Congress in 2016. INORMS 2016 will be led by the Victoria Chapter under the direction of Convenors Dr Tania Bezzobs from Swinburne University of Technology and Ms Janette Hocking. The event will be held from 11-15 September at the Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre.



OUR FINANCES

ARMS continues to grow both in terms of members and reach of activities. As a result, the complexity of the budgeting and financial management responsibilities have also increased and it has become ever more critical to ensure we have a model in place that supports the ongoing sustainability of the Society.

In looking at the picture painted by the audited financial report, it is pleasing that ARMS attained a 12% increase (\$130k) in revenue compared to the previous financial year and a total net profit of \$42.9k. Although this was substantially less than last year, this can be attributed to reinvesting into key strategic priorities to progress the aims and objectives of the Society and for the benefit of members.

For example, this financial year we saw a steep increase in the income generated from the Accreditation Program, which is also thanks, in part, to the successful introduction of the new Professional Level Program. As a result, I'm happy to report that we have now recouped our initial investment in the program from its inception.

Finally, it should be noted that this year a new strategy was implemented to maximise the return on our reserve funds. The Executive investigated and approved the establishment of a highly diversified investment portfolio with the assistance of financial advice firm, Stanford Brown. Despite a volatile market since the funds were invested in August, we have maximised the preservation of our capital and achieved a 1.21% ROI for this financial year, remaining confident that this is a wise long-term strategy.
